So, what's going on in them "thar" hills!?!

Ski area owners have big plans to invest millions of dollars in improvements at many of the areas we ski over the next several years. Below are just some of the highlights for planned and scheduled improvements for new lodges and lifts!

Snoqualmie Pass
Summit Central (Ski
Acres) A massive
new lodge will come
online within the
next several years,
and the ski area will
overhaul its out-of-



base alpha lifts. The resort will upgrade Central Express to another high-speed lift of yet-to-be-determined capacity and will replace Triple 60, a 1983 CTEC triple, with a high-speed quad (quite possibly a refurbished Central Express). A brand-new lodge, snowmaking and alpine coaster will round out improvements at Central.

Summit West (Snoqualmie Pass) The resort will upgrade Pacific Crest – a 1997 fixed-grip quad that is the area's main out-of-base mover – with another TBD high-speed detachable lift. The current Pacific Crest lift will likely move over to Wildside - currently a 1974 Riblet triple.



Alpental has announced that they'll be adding three new chairlifts over the course of the next two seasons. The new chairlift for the 2023-24 season will be the replacement of the Sessel. This Riblet will be replaced by a fixed-

grip triple chairlift. The new lift's capacity will be nearly doubled, carrying 1800 riders an hour. The Doppelmayr chairlift will have a length of 1790 feet, a vertical rise of 590, and a max operating speed of 500 feet per minute. Some of the chairlift features will include a loading conveyor and a top terminal that will be further up the slope to provide easier access to the future International chairlift. They will also begin construction on the first phase of the Edelweiss & International chairlift projects.

Crystal Mountain

Over the next five years, \$100 million in infrastructure and service advancements will be invested at Crystal Mountain which will transform the base with a focus on greater access, more space and significantly enhanced skier services. Work has begun with a \$25 million investment in additional parking and a new 25,000 sq. ft. skier services facility, called Mountain Commons. The project is expected to be open for the 23/24 winter season barring further construction delays.

Stevens Pass

A fixed grip quad will replace Kehr's chair, a Riblet dating back to 1964 for the 2023/24 winter season. This is the third new chairlift planned for Vail Resorts at Stevens and will improve out-of-base capacity.

Whistler/Blackcomb

Construction continues on upgrades to the Creekside Gondola and Big Red Express, both of which are on-track to open in time for this year's season. Creekside Gondola, which was previously a 6-person gondola, will be replaced with a new high-speed 10-person gondola, and will significantly improve wait times and increase out-of-base uphill capacity by 35%. Big Red Express will go from a high-speed 4-person lift to a high-speed 6-person chair, increasing uphill capacity by nearly 30%.

Sun Valley

Sun Valley has an ambitious plans, first, a new Challenger six place chairlift is proposed to replace the aging Challenger and Greyhawk detachable quads. The wider gauge Challenger would feature a mid-unloading station at the top of the Upper Greyhawk and move 2,400 skiers per hour. The project also includes a new Flying Squirrel/Lift A detachable quad. The original Flying Squirrel opened



in 1972 and operated until February 1st, 2014, when it was destroyed by a drive terminal fire and was removed the following offseason. Both new lifts would be constructed in 2023 and open for the 2023-24 ski season.

Qualifications: Any person who is considered to have made an outstanding contribution to Northwest skiing, in any capacity, shall be eligible for election to the NW Ski Hall of Fame. Selection shall be made from varied categories, i.e., competitors, officials, operators, ski patrol, instructors, industry, etc.

Nominations may be made for anyone living or posthumously. A bio of about two pages should be submitted and endorsement statements by others supporting the nomination are encouraged along with pictures.

Remembrances

Jack "Corky" Corrock 1926-2023



Jack was born in Seattle in 1926 and passed away Feb, 2023. He was preceded in death by his wife, Lila Sarri Corrock in December of 2017. They met each other in junior high school in Seattle, which resulted in a marriage of 69 years.

Jack was a Merchant Marine in WW2 and after the war, they settled in West Seattle where they raised three children, Kenny, Susie and Anne. Lila developed a love for skiing with Jack, vacationing each winter in Sun Valley with friends. Their life-dream was to spend a year living in the Alps and in 1960, their dream came true. They lived 5 months in Kitzbuhel then traveled around in a Volkswagen van. Their time in Kitzbuhel sparked an interest in ski racing. All 3 kids had successful ski racing careers, becoming members of the U.S. Ski Team with Susie capturing a bronze medal in the 1972 Sapporo Olympics.

Upon returning to Seattle after their year in Austria, their ski adventures brought them to Crystal Mountain where they were original founders. With Jack as a builder, and their Austrian experience, in 1964 they build the Alpine Inn and Snorting Elk Pub, a favorite watering hole of skiers to this day. Lila would be at home raising kids and taking reservations for lodgers at the Alpine while Jack managed the Alpine Inn. Lila and the kids would join him on weekends.

In 1970, they moved permanently to Sun Valley fulfilling another life-long dream. Winters were skiing and summers were spent traveling, wind surfing, boating, camping and hiking.

Jack served on three boards in the ski world. He was a founder and board member at Crystal Mountain, a board member of the U.S. Ski Team, and founding member of the Sun Valley Ski Education Foundation.

They were long time members of the PNW Ancient Skier Association and were seen enjoying themselves on the dance floor at the 2016 Sun Valley reunion banquet. A memorial service was held on Sunday, March 26th in Ketchum Idaho.
